National Council Member Elections and Recognition

LITTLE ROCK, Ark.—On March 13, during regional business meetings held during its 2026 National Convention, several Alpha Chi regions elected new leaders who serve dual roles as members of Alpha Chi’s board of directors, the National Council. They were installed on the Council during a ceremony led by Council President **Dr. Linda Cowan** of West Liberty University.

Incumbent Region I Secretary-Treasurer **Dr. Dennis Hall** of Angelo State University was reelected to his second four-year term. The newly combined Region V-VI elected **Dr. Linda Latimer** of Post University to complete the remaining two years of the previously vacant 2024-28 term of Region VI Secretary-Treasurer.

A characteristic that has made Alpha Chi unique is that student representatives, elected by regions, serve dual roles in national leadership. During the 2026 regional business meetings, two new Regional Student Representatives were elected to two-year terms. These students will have a direct opportunity to influence and determine the path Alpha Chi will take. The students elected to join the National Council this year were: Region II – **Chloe Caffey, Ouachita Baptist University** and Region IV – **Kadence Berry, Lindenwood University**.

Leaving the Council was **Dr. Craig Rogers** of Campbellsville University, having served three terms as Region V Secretary-Treasurer (2014-2026). Dr. Rogers helped steer the Society, serving on a variety of Council committees such as Scholarships and Audit/Finance during his tenure.

Alpha Chi recognized the following Regional Student Representatives who also contributed positively to the work of the Council and completed their terms of service: Region II’s **Alexander Robinson, Southeastern Oklahoma State University**; Region IV’s **Nolan Reynolds, Waldorf University**; and Region VI’s **Azsha Ray, Pine Manor College**.
